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## Victoria Coalition receives Dane G. Hansen Grant

The Victoria Community Coalition has received word that they have been selected to receive a \$500,000 grant from the Dane G. Hansen Foundation of Logan, Kansas. This is the first sizable grant they have received.

According to Board President Jeff Pfeifer, this award is a huge boost to the Coalition's efforts to repurpose the former Victoria nursing home, now known as St. John's Place. Phase 1 is to build 12 senior apartments, a space to accommodate 2023 children for child care, a community center and a satellite site for the Ellis county Historical Society.

The Coalition is in the final planning stage to kick off a capital campaign with a goal of raising \$650,000.

Recently the Board was awarded the Heartland Community Foundation's Community Impact award for "Outstanding service to others, commitment to

## **Council appoints Matt Sander**



The Victoria City Council has a new member at the table, following Councilman Zach Kanzenbach's resignation. Matt Sander was appointed to fill that post until the next election.

Sander, a native of Victoria, returned to the area after working out of state for several years. He currently is employed at Grainger in Hays as a Senior Government Account Manager, a position he has held for over three years. He has been with the company for over ten years. Before that, he was employed as a territory manager of sales for Milwaukee Power Tools in Tulsa.

Sander says his decision to return to Victoria evolved after livfing in larger cities for many years as he "better understood the values and benefits that a small town like Victoria offers." He also wanted to raise his family here and to become more involved with the family farming operation.

He and his wife Erika have two daughters: Adalynn, seven, and Harper, five.

An alumni of Victoria High School, Sander holds a degree in Business Administration from FHSU.

In accepting the Council position, Sander says he wanted to become more involved in the community and to give back in some capacity. He hopes to be seen "as a common-sensed member of the Council who contributed and helped continue the upward trajectory that the City of Victoria is currently on."

In addition to his new Council position, Sander also serves on the board of the Victoria Alumni Association.

On the day of, customers have three options: home delivery, carry out or dine-in with an all-you-can eat option. At their last event, 290 meals were served.

For some of the work crew, those Fridays are a 12-hour day counting preparation, serving and clean up. Just the fish preparation involves two days, one for thawing and refrigerating, and then breading and frying. Usually the project involves a crew of 20-25 workers.

The meal is always taste-tested by a crew at lunchtime to be sure of quality control.

Proceeds from the events go to support a variety of projects in the community.

This has become a valued community tradition.
