Customer Services

We continue to offer our citizens the option to receive their monthly **bill by email.** Contact us if you are interested in that.

We also provide the option to have your monthly payment drafted from your checking account. This requires filling out a form and providing us with a copy of a voided check. This is an easy way to eliminate the worry of paying on time.

Residents aged 65 or over qualify for a **reduced rate** on their trash fee. We have the form in our office and this requires a driver's license to validate your age.

UPS pickup is also a service. We are a pickup location so you can drop off pre-labeled packages or we can process your package for you.



Trash Reminders

The City is asking for your cooperation with the solid waste removal program. Please do not put out open containers or trash bags in pickup area until the DAY OF collection. This will help prevent the spread of trash due to weather conditions, animals, etc.

Trash cans 30 gallons or smaller may have unbagged trash; any larger must have trash bagged for removal. City employees are not allowed to lift containers larger than 30 gal. or exceeding 80 lbs. Larger containers are allowed as long as trash is bagged.

Please try to limit refuse to approximately 4-30 gal containers maximum. The City does understand that certain holidays, occasions generate additional refuse and such will be acceptable. A household that consistently generates more refuse than this maximum may be subject to a higher fee.

Please have all trash curbside or at pickup point by 8:00 am on collection days to guarantee pickup.


Thank you for helping keep our town clean!
