Dollar General opens for business

Since late December, the new Victoria Dollar General Store has been open, welcoming customers. It has been long awaited and has created a lot of excitement. As patrons shop the aisles. you can overhear conversations about how much it means to be able to shop locally and have such a good variety of merchandise.

Mike Rome is the store manager, overseeing all operations at the facility. Rome left his prior position with FedEx explaining that this was a job opportunity he couldn't pass up. Rome kept smiling as he discussed how he was hired for his position and proceeded through the process from number of interviews to on-the-job training. Currently, the store has hired an assistant manager and five sales associates, some full-time and others part-time. Rome says he expects to hire at least two more in the near future.

In discussing some of what he sees as priorities with his operation, Rome stated that his staff will be greeting customers and ensuring good service. The store has one cashier for those who want that personal service and two self-checkout stations as well: one for cards only and one for either cash or cards. For those who are interested, there is a Dollar General app that offers specials.

Keeping merchandise well stocked, maintaining clear aisles, and ensuring the store will be clean are some of Rome's other goals.

The store is open daily from 8:00 am to 10:00 pm.

Because the store is accessed from Highway 40, drivers are advised to use caution when approaching from either direction, being on the lookout for slowing traffic, occasional pedestrians and bike riders.

St. John's Place Update

In December, the Victoria Community Coalition received an early Christmas present when they were notified that they had been awarded a \$590,000 capital improvement grant from the Patterson Family Foundation (PFF) of Kansas City, Missouri, through their Thriving Rural Grant Program. The money will be used to repair and replace the roof at St. John's Place, the former nursing home.

"This feels like a Christmas miracle," commented VCC Chairman Jeff Pfeifer. "It allows us to move forward with Phase I redevelopment and secure the remaining building for future phases."

Construction of Phase I apartments will begin in early 2024 and will include 12 units for independent seniors and adults with disabilities. In addition to roof replacement and new construction, work will also include asbestos removal in areas planned for future development. VCC has applied to the Kansas Brownfields Program for assistance with the asbestos removal.

Also, following the signing of a lease agreement with the Ellis County Historical Society, work will soon begin on their exhibit and storage space.

To date, thousands of hours have been donated by board members and additional community volunteers toward fundraising, grant writing, building design, interior demolition and more.

Pfeifer stated, "None of our progress would be possible without support from so many. Please keep VCC and St. John's Place in your mind, heart and prayers now and throughout 2024. City revises new property tax plan

The Neighborhood Revitalization Plan (NRP) that was announced in the November newsletter has been slightly changed and is now in full effect. With the changes that have been adopted, even more of property taxes may be returned to property owners. The increases in potentially refunded taxes are thanks to the Victoria School District and Ellis County also agreeing to participate in the NRP. These refunds are available for 10 years after a project has been completed. Residential properties are eligible for a 70% refund of taxes, and commercial properties are eligible for a 95% refund.

To qualify for the NRP, the value of a property's assessed value has to increase by \$10,000. This valuation is based on the County Appraiser's assessment that is issued each year. Before any project is accepted into the NRP, paperwork needs to be filled out at both City Hall and at the Ellis County Administration Building. School district studying four-day week

USD #432 is currently in the process of examining the pros and cons of changing to a four-day week. Part of the fact -finding for this study was having a representative body visit the Ingalls School District which currently operates on that format. District administrators as well as a group of teachers, two parents, two students and one board member spent the day learning about how that district operates.

A survey has been conducted to get feedback on the pros and cons as seen by the participants. A community meeting was also held on Jan. 13 to provide an opportunity to share information and field questions from those in attendance either in person or by Zoom.

Newly elected Board President Ryan Mauch commented, "We are early in the feedback stage and are definitely listening to all sides."

The district has identified both pros and cons for all stake-holders who would be affected by this change including the following:

- At the administrative level pros include more time for quality professional development, recruitment and retention of teachers; cons include minimal cost savings and concerns about academic growth.
- At the faculty level, pros include less burnout and increased time for collaboration; cons include adjusting the pacing of instruction and less time for students at their 'safe space';
- ♦ At the **parental** level pros include

less stressed students and a better of traditional and hands-on learning; concerns include the issue of child care and transportation to activities on the off days

 At the student level, pros include more time for work-based learning internships and less stress; cons include longer time required to stay engaged.
